New York, NY - "Hate, racism, discrimination, and bigotry must never be met with silence or half-hearted rebukes, stated Guillermo Chacon," President of the Latino Commission on AIDS and Founder of the Hispanic Health Network. The events that unfolded in Charlottesville are a reminder that the racism and white supremacy that has been allowed to fester for generations has recently been heightened by the policies and rhetoric of our current administration. There are no two sides. Donald Trump's refusal to clearly condemn white supremacists, white nationalists, neo-Nazis, and the 'alt-right' is a failure of leadership. Everyone, must explicitly and unequivocally condemn this violent extremism. "We cannot accept excuses for white supremacy and acts of domestic terrorism. We must condemn them. Period."
